What’s Your Logline?

A logline is a film term for a single line that describes a film, scene or character.

1. Each of you write a logline for yourself. Make sure it is an honest, serious statement that represents something you believe about yourself.
2. Discuss each other’s loglines. Are they negative or are they positive?
3. Discuss the negative things you feel about yourselves. Why do you feel that about yourself?
4. Parents discuss with your student what loglines you had growing up and how it made you feel.
5. Many times we think we’ve never been good enough, but that’s not what the God of the universe thinks. Now rewrite each other’s logline with a new statement that reflects how God sees you.

Read [Luke 19:1-10](#) together and answer the following questions.

6. What was Zacchaeus profession? Why were the tax collectors hated more than any other?
7. Notice that the people wouldn’t even call Zacchaeus by his name. They just called him “sinner”! Discuss what you think Zacchaeus logline was (tax collector, thief, crook, etc.).
8. Discuss how Jesus saw Zacchaeus. Jesus called Zacchaeus “a son of Abraham”, why is this the greatest compliment you could give to a Jew?
9. Jesus went into this man’s hurt, and He retold his story. Discuss how this changed Zacchaeus’ life (see verses 8 & 9).
10. Pray together as a family and tell God how thankful you are that He loves you with an everlasting love.
11. Discuss as a family what you will do this week to build one another up and to help one another see themselves as God see’s them. Look for opportunities to help someone rewrite their story based on the truth of God’s love for them.
12. End this time with an exercise called the “hot seat”. Each one will take a turn sitting in the “hot seat”. Everyone else will take turns saying encouraging and loving things about the one in the hot seat. Repeat this exercise until everyone has had a chance to be in the hot seat.
